Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Trustees San Pasqual Valley Unified School District Winterhaven, California

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the San Pasqual Valley Unified School District ("the District") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of San Pasqual Valley Unified School District as of June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

Change in Accounting Principles

As described in Note A to the financial statements, in 2015, San Pasqual Valley Unified School District adopted new accounting guidance, Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, and GASB Statement No. 71, Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date -- an amendment of GASB Statement No. 68. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis, budgetary comparison information, schedule of funding progress for OPEB benefits, schedule of the District's proportionate share of the net pension liability and schedule of District pension contributions identified as Required Supplementary Information in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the Required Supplementary Information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the San Pasqual Valley Unified School District's basic financial statements. The combining financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not required parts of the basic financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U. S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying other supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the State's audit guide, *Standards and Procedures for Audits of California K-12 Local Education Agencies 2014-15,* published by the Education Audit Appeals Panel, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining financial statements and other supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining financial statements and other supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

San Pasqual Valley Unified School District Management's Discussion and Analysis June 30, 2015 (Unaudited)

This section of San Pasqual Valley Unified School District's (SPVUSD) annual financial report presents management's discussion and analysis of the SPVUSD's financial performance during the year ending June 30, 2015. The management's discussion and analysis is required as an element of the reporting model established by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) in Statement Number 34. Comparative financial data and statements will reflect prior year information when indicated. The district's financial statements follow this section.

Financial Highlights

- The SPVUSD's assets and deferred outflows of resources exceeded liabilities and deferred inflows of resources by \$14.5 million.
- Total change in District net position was decreased by \$.25 million.
- Total revenues were \$13.81 million.
- The SPVUSD enrollment decreased by 24 students for a total enrollment of 758 students in October 2014 compared to 782 students in October 2013.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the SPVUSD's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements comprise three components: (1) government-wide financial statements; (2) fund financial statements; and (3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

1. Government-wide financial statements.

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the SPVUSD's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

- The statement of net position presents information on all of the assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources of the SPVUSD, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in the net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the district is improving or deteriorating.
- The statement of activities presents information showing how the net position of the SPVUSD changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave). The government-wide financial statements can be found later in this report.

2. Fund financial statements

A fund is a group of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The SPVUSD, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the district are governmental funds except for the Associated Student Body accounts, which are a fiduciary fund.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial However, unlike the government-wide financial statements. governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the government's near-term financing requirements. Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The SPVUSD maintains eleven individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general fund, and the special reserve for other than capital projects fund. Data from the other nine governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual data for each of these non-major funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report.

The District adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison statement will be provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget with the closing of the books at June 30, 2015. The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found later in this report.

Notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential for a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found later in this report.

Other information. The combining statements referred to earlier in connection with non-major governmental funds are presented later in this report. Individual fund statements and schedules can be found in this report.

Government-wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the SPVUSD, assets exceeded liabilities by \$24.18 million at the close of the most recent fiscal year.

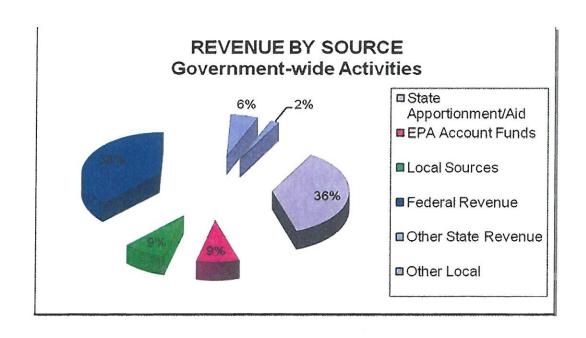

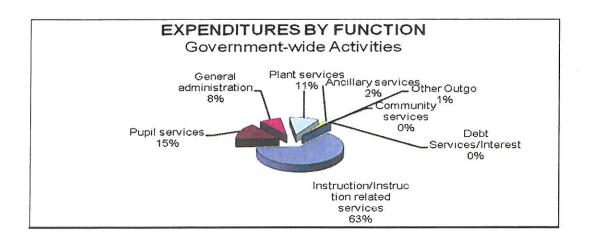
- SPVUSD has invested 16.57 million dollars in capital assets (e.g., land, equipment, buildings and improvements net of accumulated depreciation), less any related debt (bonds payable and obligations under capital leases less unspent bond proceeds) used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The SPVUSD uses these capital assets to provide services to students; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the district's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.
- The remaining balance of non-restricted net position may be used to meet the SPVUSD's obligations to students, employees, and creditors and to honor next year's budget.

At the end of the current fiscal year, the SPVUSD has a positive balance of net position.

Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF)

The District's primary funding source is a combination of local property taxes and state revenues. The California Department of Education computes the local control funding formula (LCFF) on statewide rates multiplied by the District's average daily attendance (ADA) as reported at the Second Principal apportionment period (P2). The result is then reduced by property tax revenues and education protection account funds paid by the state under proposition 30. The remaining balance is paid from the state General Fund, in the form of LCFF State Aid. The District is not at risk of losing these funding sources, as long as the school maintains a steady level of ADA, as these funding sources are mandated by the California State Constitution to fund schools.

Financial Analysis of the District's Funds

As noted earlier, the SPVUSD uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental funds. The focus of the SPVUSD's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the district's financing requirements. As the SPVUSD completed the year, its net position has a combined balance of \$15.5 million. This is the seventh year the district has compiled these reports. This compares with the 2008-09 net position balance of \$11.7 million. The net change in assets is a positive \$2.8 million.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The SPVUSD's budget is prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting according to California law. During the year, the Board revised the SPVUSD's budget. Budget amendments were to reflect changes in programs and related funding.

- The district received the Innovative Approaches to Literacy Grant for a two year period totaling \$502,000. This is funding a support teacher, books and various other literacy projects throughout the district.
- The district also received additional previous year's Impact Aid claims of \$493,000 which helped to improve the budget deficit.

 Salary and benefits increased due to step and column and increases to PERS and STRS retirement systems as well as a health benefits increase. During the 2015-16 school year, contracts were settled with both certificated and classified staff and a retro payment for the 2014-15 school year of 2% was made.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

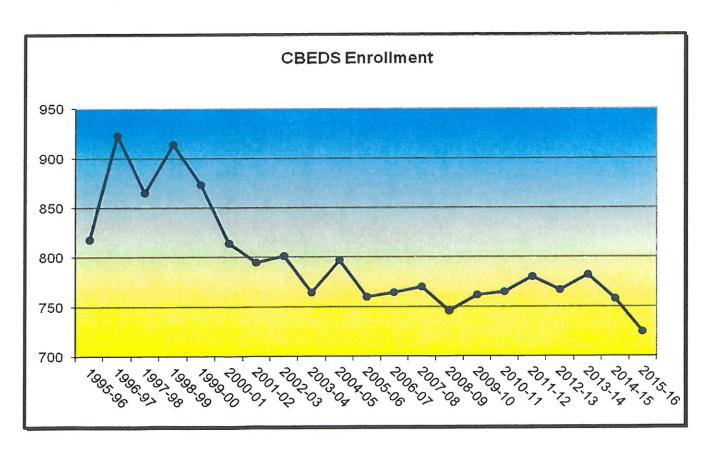
Capital Assets. The Board of Trustees adopted a minimum of \$5,000 as the threshold for recognition of capital assets for GASB34 reporting. The District previously contracted with American Appraisal Services to conduct the District's capital asset inventory and valuation. Those results, net of depreciation are contained in this report, updated as of June 30, 2015.

Additional information on the district's capital assets can be found in the basic financial statements.

Debt Administration. The District paid principal and interest on the lease purchase debt which provides one classroom to house Community Day School students.

Changing Enrollment within the District

The SPVUSD enrollment decreased by 24 students in 2014-15. Efforts have been made to improve student attendance and sustain enrollment, however, October 2015 enrollment decreased by 33 to 725.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

A. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

San Pasqual Valley Unified School District (District) accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the Department of Education's "California School Accounting Manual". The accounting policies of the District conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA).

1. Reporting Entity

The District's combined financial statements include the accounts of all its operations. The District evaluated whether any other entity should be included in these financial statements. The criteria for including organizations as component units within the District's reporting entity, as set forth in GASB Statement No. 14, "The Financial Reporting Entity," include whether:

- the organization is legally separate (can sue and be sued in its name)
- the District holds the corporate powers of the organization
- the District appoints a voting majority of the organization's board
- the District is able to impose its will on the organization
- the organization has the potential to impose a financial benefit/burden on the District
- there is fiscal dependency by the organization on the District

The District also evaluated each legally separate, tax-exempt organization whose resources are used principally to provide support to the District to determine if its omission from the reporting entity would result in financial statements which are misleading or incomplete. GASB Statement No. 14 requires inclusion of such an organization as a component unit when: 1) The economic resources received or held by the organization are entirely or almost entirely for the direct benefit of the District, its component units or its constituents; and 2) The District or its component units is entitled to, or has the ability to otherwise access, a majority of the economic resources received or held by the organization; and 3) Such economic resources are significant to the District.

Based on these criteria, the District has no component units. Additionally, the District is not a component unit of any other reporting entity as defined by the GASB Statement.

2. Basis of Presentation, Basis of Accounting

a. Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Statements: The statement of net position and the statement of activities include the financial activities of the overall government, except for fiduciary activities. Eliminations have been made to minimize the double-counting of internal activities. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other nonexchange transactions.

The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each function of the District's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program or function and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. The District does not allocate indirect expenses in the statement of activities. Program revenues include (a) fees, fines, and charges paid by the recipients of goods or services offered by the programs and (b) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements: The fund financial statements provide information about the District's funds, with separate statements presented for each fund category. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major governmental funds, each displayed in a separate column. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as nonmajor funds.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund. This is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the District except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

In addition, the District reports the following fund types:

Special Revenue Funds: These funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes.

Capital Projects Funds: These funds are used to account for the proceeds from bond issuances and for the acquisition of capital assets of the district.

Agency Funds: These funds are used to report student activity funds and other resources held in a purely custodial capacity (assets equal liabilities). Agency funds typically involve only the receipt, temporary investment, and remittance of fiduciary resources to individuals, private organizations, or other governments.

Fiduciary funds are reported in the fiduciary fund financial statements. However, because their assets are held in a trustee or agent capacity and are therefore not available to support District programs, these funds are not included in the government-wide statements.

b. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting

Government-wide and Fiduciary Fund Financial Statements: These financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus. They are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. Nonexchange transactions, in which the District gives (or receives) value without directly receiving (or giving) equal value in exchange, include property taxes, grants, entitlements, and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied. Revenue from grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

Governmental Fund Financial Statements: Governmental funds are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when measurable and available. The District does not consider revenues collected after its year-end to be available in the current period. Revenues from local sources consist primarily of property taxes. Property tax revenues and revenues received from the State are recognized under the susceptible-to-accrual concept. Miscellaneous revenues are recorded as revenue when received in cash because they are generally not measurable until actually received. Investment earnings are recorded as earned, since they are both measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on general long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. General capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

When the District incurs an expenditure or expense for which both restricted and unrestricted resources may be used, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources.

3. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid. All encumbrances are liquidated as of June 30.

4. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for all governmental funds. By state law, the District's governing board must adopt a final budget no later than July 1. A public hearing must be conducted to receive comments prior to adoption. The District's governing board satisfied these requirements.

These budgets are revised by the District's governing board and district superintendent during the year to give consideration to unanticipated income and expenditures.

Formal budgetary integration was used as a management control device during the year for all budgeted funds. The District employs budget control by minor object and by individual appropriation accounts. Expenditures cannot legally exceed appropriations by major object code.

5. Revenues and Expenses

Revenues - Exchange and Non-Exchange

Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available. Available means that the resources will be collected within the current year or expected to be collected soon enough thereafter, to be used to pay liabilities of the current fiscal year. Generally, available is defined as collectible within 60 days. However, to achieve comparability of reporting among California districts and so as to not distort normal revenue patterns, with specific respect to reimbursement grants and corrections to State-aid apportionments, the California Department of Education has defined available for districts as collectible within one year. The following revenue sources are considered to be both measurable and available at fiscal year-end: State apportionments, interest, certain grants, and other local sources.

Non-exchange transactions are transactions in which the District receives value without directly giving equal value in return, including property taxes, certain grants, entitlements, and donations. Revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year in which the taxes are received. Revenue from certain grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include time and purpose restrictions. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must also be available before it can be recognized.

b. Expenses and Expenditures

On the accrual basis of accounting, expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred. The measurement focus of governmental fund accounting is on decreases in net financial resources (expenditures) rather than expenses. Expenditures are generally recognized in the accounting period in which the related fund liability is incurred, if measurable, and typically paid within 90 days. Principal and interest on long-term obligations, which has not matured, are recognized when paid in the governmental funds as expenditures. Allocations of costs, such as depreciation and amortization, are not recognized in the governmental funds but are recognized in the government-wide financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

Assets, Liabilities, and Equity

Deposits and Investments

Cash balances held in banks and in revolving funds are insured to \$250,000 by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation. All cash held by the financial institutions is fully insured or collateralized.

In accordance with Education Code Section 41001, the District maintains substantially all its cash in the Imperial County Treasury. The county pools these funds with those of other districts in the county and invests the cash. These pooled funds are carried at cost, which approximates market value. Interest earned is deposited quarterly into participating funds, except for the Tax Override Funds, in which interest earned is credited to the general fund. Any investment losses are proportionately shared by all funds in the pool.

The county is authorized to deposit cash and invest excess funds by California Government Code Section 53648 et seq. The funds maintained by the county are either secured by federal depository insurance or are collateralized.

Information regarding the amount of dollars invested in derivatives with Imperial County Treasury was not available.

Stores Inventories and Prepaid Expenditures

Inventories are recorded using the purchases method in that the cost is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are purchased. Inventories are valued at average cost and consist of expendable supplies held for consumption. Reported inventories are equally offset by a fund balance reserve, which indicates that these amounts are not "available for appropriation and expenditure" even though they are a component of net current assets.

The District has the option of reporting an expenditure in governmental funds for prepaid items either when purchased or during the benefiting period. The District has chosen to report the expenditure during the benefiting period.

c. Capital Assets

Purchased or constructed capital assets are reported at cost or estimated historical cost. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of the donation. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets' lives are not capitalized. A capitalization threshold of \$5,000 is used.

Capital assets are being depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

d. Compensated Absences

Accumulated unpaid employee vacation benefits are recognized as liabilities of the District. The current portion of the liabilities is recognized in the general fund at year end.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

Accumulated sick leave benefits are not recognized as liabilities of the District. The District's policy is to record sick leave as an operating expense in the period taken since such benefits do not vest nor is payment probable; however, unused sick leave is added to the creditable service period for calculation of retirement benefits when the employee retires.

e. Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue arises when potential revenue does not meet both the "measurable" and "available" criteria for recognition in the current period or when resources are received by the District prior to the incurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when both revenue recognition criteria are met, or when the District has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for unearned revenue is removed from the balance sheet and revenue is recognized.

f. Interfund Activity

Interfund activity results from loans, services provided, reimbursements or transfers between funds. Loans are reported as interfund receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation. Services provided, deemed to be at market or near market rates, are treated as revenues and expenditures or expenses. Reimbursements occur when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related cost as a reimbursement. All other interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers In and Transfers Out are netted and presented as a single "Transfers" line on the government-wide statement of activities. Similarly, interfund receivables and payables are netted and presented as a single "Internal Balances" line of the government-wide statement of net position.

g. Property Taxes

Secured property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of March 1. Taxes are payable in two installments on November 15 and March 15. Unsecured property taxes are payable in one installment on or before August 31. The County of Imperial bills and collects the taxes for the District.

h. Fund Balances - Governmental Funds

Fund balances of the governmental funds are classified as follows:

Nonspendable Fund Balance - represents amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form (such as inventory or prepaid insurance) or legally required to remain intact (such as notes receivable or principal of a permanent fund).

Restricted Fund Balance - represents amounts that are constrained by external parties, constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed Fund Balance - represents amounts that can only be used for a specific purpose because of a formal action by the District's governing board. Committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the governing board removes those constraints by taking the same type of formal action. Committed fund balance amounts may be used for other purposes with appropriate due process by the governing board. Commitments are typically done through adoption and amendment of the budget. Committed fund balance amounts differ from restricted balances in that the constraints on their use do not come from outside parties, constitutional provisions, or enabling legislation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

Assigned Fund Balance - represents amounts which the District intends to use for a specific purpose, but that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed. Intent may be stipulated by the governing board or by an official or body to which the governing board delegates the authority. Specific amounts that are not restricted or committed in a special revenue, capital projects, debt service or permanent fund are assigned for purposes in accordance with the nature of their fund type or the fund's primary purpose. Assignments within the general fund conveys that the intended use of those amounts is for a specific purpose that is narrower than the general purposes of the District itself.

Unassigned Fund Balance - represents amounts which are unconstrained in that they may be spent for any purpose. Only the general fund reports a positive unassigned fund balance. Other governmental funds might report a negative balance in this classification because of overspending for specific purposes for which amounts had been restricted, committed or assigned.

When an expenditure is incurred for a purpose for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, the District considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When an expenditure is incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the District considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally unassigned funds.

i. Minimum Fund Balance Policy

The District maintains a minimum reserve, within the general fund, an amount not less than the amount required by state law. The minimum reserve shall apply towards the established minimum Reserve for Economic Uncertainties or an amount that meets or exceeds the requirements by law. The District is committed to maintaining a prudent level of financial resources to protect against the need to reduce service levels because of temporary revenue shortfalls or unpredicted expenditures. Because amounts in the nonspendable, restricted, committed, and assigned categories are subject to varying constraints in use, the Reserve for Economic Uncertainties consists of balances that are otherwise unassigned.

7. Deferred Inflows and Deferred Outflows of Resources

Deferred outflows of resources is a consumption of net assets or net position that is applicable to a future reporting period. Deferred inflows of resources is an acquisition of net assets or net position that is applicable to a future reporting period. Deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources are recorded in accordance with GASB Statement numbers 63 and 65.

8. GASB 54 Fund Presentation

Consistent with fund reporting requirements established by GASB Statement #54, Fund 17 (Special Reserve for Other Than Capital Outlay) and Fund 20 (Special Reserve Fund for Postemployment Benefits) were merged with the General Fund for purposes of presentation in the audit report.

9. Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, pension expense, and information about the fiduciary net position of the CalPERS Schools Pool Cost-Sharing Multiple-Employer Plan (CalPERS Plan) and CalSTRS Schools Pool Cost-Sharing Multiple Employer Plan (CalSTRS Plan) and additions to/deductions from the CalPERS Plan and CalSTRS Plan's fiduciary net positions have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the CalPERS Financial Office and CalSTRS Financial Office. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when currently due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

10. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the use of management's estimates. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

11. Change in Accounting Policies

In June, 2012 the GASB issued Statement No. 68, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions -- an Amendment of GASB No. 27," which is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2014. The District has implemented the provisions of this Statement for the year ended June 30, 2015.

The Statement requires numerous new pension disclosures in the notes to the financial statements and two new 10-year schedules as required supplementary information. Also, for the first time the District is required to recognize pension expense, report deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, a net pension liability for its proportionate shares of the collective pension expense, collective deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and collective net pension liability. The reporting of these new amounts on the government-wide financial statements, along with the effect of the restatement of the beginning net position, if any, will also affect the District's government-wide net position.

In November, 2013 the GASB issued Statement No. 71, "Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date - an amendment of GASB Statement No. 68". This Statement amends Paragraph 137 of Statement 68 to require that, at transition, a government recognize a beginning deferred outflow of resources for its pension contributions, if any, made subsequent to the measurement date of the beginning net pension liability. Statement 68, as amended, continues to require that beginning balances for other deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions be reported at transition only if it is practical to determine all such amounts. The District has implemented the provisions of this Statement for the year ended June 30, 2015.

Cash and Investments

1. Cash in County Treasury:

In accordance with Education Code Section 41001, the District maintains substantially all of its cash in the Imperial County Treasury as part of the common investment pool (\$8,341,122 as of June 30, 2015). The fair value of the District's portion of this pool as of that date, as provided by the pool sponsor, was \$8,341,122. Assumptions made in determining the fair value of the pooled investment portfolios are available from the County Treasurer.

The District is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool as the District is required to deposit all receipts and collections of monies with their County Treasurer (Education Code Section 41001). The fair value of the District's investments in the pool is reported in the accounting financial statements as amounts based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of the portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

2. Cash on Hand, in Banks, and in Revolving Fund

Cash balances on hand and in banks (\$44,445 as of June 30, 2015) and in the revolving fund (\$2,500) are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation. All cash held by the financial institution is fully insured or collateralized.

3. Investments Authorized by the California Government Code and the District's Investment Policy

The table below identifies the investment types that are authorized for the District by the California Government Code (or the District's investment policy, where more restrictive). The table also identifies certain provisions of the California Government Code (or the District's investment policy where more restrictive) that address interest rate risk, credit risk, and concentration of credit risk. This table does not address investments of debt proceeds held by bond trustee that are governed by the provisions of debt agreements of the District, rather than the general provisions of the California Government Code or the District's investment policy.

4. Analysis of Specific Deposit and Investment Risks

GASB Statement No. 40 requires a determination as to whether the District was exposed to the following specific investment risks at year end and if so, the reporting of certain related disclosures:

a. Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. The county is restricted by Government Code Section 53635 pursuant to Section 53601 to invest only in time deposits, U.S. government securities, state registered warrants, notes or bonds, State Treasurer's investment pool, bankers' acceptances, commercial paper, negotiable certificates of deposit, and repurchase or reverse repurchase agreements. The ratings of securities by nationally recognized rating agencies are designed to give an indication of credit risk. At year end, the District was not exposed to credit risk.

b. Custodial Credit Risk

Deposits are exposed to custodial credit risk if they are not covered by depository insurance and the deposits are uncollateralized, collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent but not in the District's name. The California Government Code and the District's investment policy do not contain legal or policy requirements that would limit the exposure to custodial credit risk for deposits, other than the following provision for deposits: The California Government code requires that a financial institution secure deposits made by state or local governmental units by pledging securities in an undivided collateral pool held by a depository regulated under state law (unless so waived by the governmental unit). The market value of the pledged securities in the collateral pool must equal at least 110% of the total amount deposited by the public agencies. California law also allows financial institutions to secure deposits by pledging first trust deed mortgage notes having a value of 150% of the secured public deposits.

Investment securities are exposed to custodial credit risk if the securities are uninsured, are not registered in the name of the government, and are held by either the counterparty or the counterparty's trust department or agent but not in the District's name.

As of June 30, 2015, the District's bank balances (including revolving cash) of \$46,945 were not exposed to custodial credit risk.

c. Concentration of Credit Risk

This risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer.

The investment policy of the District contains no limitations on the amount that can be invested in any one issuer beyond the amount stipulated by the California Government Code. Investments in any one issuer that represent five percent or more of the total investments are either an external investment pool and are therefore exempt. As such, the District was not exposed to concentration of credit risk.

d. Interest Rate Risk

This is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The District manages its exposure to interest rate risk by investing in the county pool.

e. Foreign Currency Risk

This is the risk that exchange rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. At year end, the District was not exposed to foreign currency risk.

5. Investment Accounting Policy

The District is required by GASB Statement No. 31 to disclose its policy for determining which investments, if any, are reported at amortized cost. The District's general policy is to report money market investments and short-term participating interest-earning investment contracts at amortized cost and to report nonparticipating interest-earning investment contracts using a cost-based measure. However, if the fair value of an investment is significantly affected by the impairment of the credit standing of the issuer or by other factors, it is reported at fair value. All other investments are reported at fair value unless a legal contract exists which guarantees a higher value. The term "short-term" refers to investments which have a remaining term of one year or less at time of purchase. The term "nonparticipating" means that the investment's value does not vary with market interest rate changes. Nonnegotiable certificates of deposit are examples of nonparticipating interest-earning investment contracts.

The District's investments in external investment pools are reported at an amount determined by the fair value per share of the pool's underlying portfolio, unless the pool is 2a7-like, in which case they are reported at share value. A 2a7-like pool is one which is not registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") as an investment company, but nevertheless has a policy that it will, and does, operate in a manner consistent with the SEC's Rule 2a7 of the Investment Company Act of 1940.

M. <u>Joint Ventures (Joint Powers Agreements)</u>

The District participates in two joint powers agreements (JPA's) entities, the Imperial Valley Property and Liability (IVPL) and the Self Insurance Program of Imperial County (SIPIC). The relationship between the District and the JPA's is such that the JPA's are not considered component units of the District for financial reporting purposes.

The JPA's arrange for and provide workers' compensation, health, and property and liability insurance for its members. The JPA's are each governed by a board consisting of a representative from each member entity. The board controls the operations of the JPA, including selection of management and approval of operating budgets, independent of any influence by the member entities beyond their representation on the board. Each member pays a premium commensurate with the level of coverage requested and shares surpluses and deficits proportionate to their participation in the JPA's.

Combined condensed financial information of the JPA's for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015 is not available.

N. Pension Plans

1. General Information About the Pension Plans

a. Plan Descriptions

Qualified employees are covered under multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans maintained by agencies of the State of California. Certificated employees are members of the California State Teachers Retirement System (CalSTRS) and classified employees are members of the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). Benefit provisions under the Plans are established by State statute and Local Government resolution. Support by the State for the CalSTRS plan is such that the plan has a special funding situation as defined by GASB Statement No. 68. CalSTRS and CalPERS issue publicly available reports that include a full description of the pension plans regarding benefit provisions, assumptions and membership information that can be found on their respective websites.

b. Benefits Provided

CalSTRS and CalPERS provide service retirement and disability benefits, annual cost of living adjustments and death benefits to plan members. Benefits are based on years of credited service, equal to one year of full-time employment. Members with five years of total service are eligible to retire at age 62 for normal benefits or at age 55 with statutorily reduced benefits. Employees hired prior to January 1, 2013 are eligible to retire at age 60 for normal benefits or at age 55 with statutorily reduced benefits. All members are eligible for non-duty disability benefits after 10 years of service. All members are eligible for death benefits after one year of total service.

c. Contributions - CalPERS

Section 20814(c) of the California Public Employees' Retirement Law requires that the employer contribution rates for all public employers be determined on an annual basis by the actuary and shall be effective on the July 1 following notice of a change in the rate. The CalPERS Board retains the authority to amend contribution rates. The total plan contributions are determined through CalPERS' annual actuarial valuation process. The actuarially determined rate is the estimated amount necessary to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability. The employer is required to contribute the difference between the actuarially determined rate and the contribution rate of employees. For the measurement period ended June 30, 2014 (measurement date), the average active employee contribution rate is 6.974% of annual pay, and the employer's contribution rate is 11.442% of annual payroll.

d. Contributions - CalSTRS

For the measurement period ended June 30, 2014 (measurement date), Section 22950 of the California Education Code requires members to contribute monthly to the system 8% of the creditable compensation upon which members' contributions under this part are based. In addition the employer required rates established by the CalSTRS Board have been established at 8.25% of creditable compensation. Rates are defined in Section 22950.5 through measurement period ending June 30, 2021. Beginning in the fiscal year 2021-22 and for each fiscal year thereafter, the CalSTRS Board has the authority to increase or decrease percentages paid specific to reflect the contribution required to eliminate by June 30, 2046, the remaining unfunded actuarial obligation with respect to service credited to members before July 1, 2014, as determined by the Board based upon a recommendation from its actuary.

e. On Behalf Payments.

Consistent with Section 22955.1 of the California Education Code, the State of California makes contributions to CalSTRS on behalf of employees working for the District. For the measurement period ended June 30, 2014 (measurement date) the State contributed 5.204002% of salaries creditable to CalSTRS. Under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, these amounts are to be reported as revenues and expenditures. Accordingly, these amounts have been recorded in these financial statements. On behalf payments have been excluded from the calculation of available reserves, and have not been included in the budgeted amounts reported in the General Fund Budgetary Comparison Schedule.

The District's net pension liability for each Plan is measured as the proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability of each of the Plans is measured as of June 30, 2014, and the total pension liability for each Plan used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2013 rolled forward to June 30, 2014 using standard update procedures. The District's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the District's long-term share of contributions to the pension plans relative to the projected contributions of all participating employers, actuarially determined. Although a valid comparison of the District's proportion at June 30, 2014 to its proportion at June 30, 2013 is not available in the first year of implementation of GASB Statement No. 68, that disclosure will be available in subsequent years.

b. Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.60% for CalSTRS and 7.50% for CalPERS. To determine whether the District bond rate should be used in the calculation of a discount rate for each plan, CalSTRS and CalPERS stress tested plans that would most likely result in a discount rate that would be different from the actuarially assumed discount rate. Based on the testing, none of the tested plans run out of assets. Therefore, the current discount rates are adequate and the use of the District bond rate calculation is not necessary for either plan. The stress test results are presented in a detailed report that can be obtained from the CalPERS and CalSTRS websites.

According to Paragraph 30 of GASB Statement No. 68, the long-term discount rate should be determined without reduction for pension plan administrative expense. The investment return assumption used in the accounting valuations is net of administrative expenses. Administrative expenses are assumed to be 15 basis points. Using this lower discount rate has resulted in a slightly higher Total Pension Liability and Net Pension Liability. CalSTRS and CalPERS checked the materiality threshold for the difference in calculation and did not find it to be a material difference.

CalSTRS and CalPERS are scheduled to review all actuarial assumptions as part of their regular Asset Liability Management (ALM) review cycle that is scheduled to be completed in February 2018. Any changes to the discount rate will require board action and proper stakeholder outreach. For these reasons, CalSTRS and CalPERS expect to continue using a discount rate net of administrative expenses for GASB 67 and GASB 68 calculations through at least the 2017-18 fiscal year. CalSTRS and CalPERS will continue to check the materiality of the difference in calculation until such time as they have changed their methodology.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class.

In determining the long-term expected rate of return, CalSTRS and CalPERS took into account both short-term and long-term market return expectations as well as the expected pension fund cash flows. Using historical returns of all the funds' asset classes, expected compound returns were calculated over the short-term (first 10 years) and long-term (11-60 years) using a building-block approach. Using the expected nominal returns for both short-term and long-term, the present value of benefits was calculated for each fund. The expected rate of return was set by calculating the single equivalent expected return that arrived at the same present value of benefits for cash flows as the one calculated using both short-term and long-term returns. The expected rate of return was then set equivalent to the single equivalent rate calculated above and rounded down to the nearest quarter of one percent.

O. Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pension Benefits

The District provides retiree health benefits up to age 65 for 7 retirees as well as 61 active employees. Eligible employees are certificated or administrative employees who have attained age 55 but not yet attained age 65, have completed 10 or more years of continuous, full time service with the District under CaISTRS. Eligible employees will receive 100% of combined costs of medical/prescription drug and dental insurance until age 65.

Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation: The District's annual other postemployment benefits (OPEB) costs (expense) is based on the annual required contribution of the employer (ARC). The District's expense is comprised of the present value of benefits accruing in the current year (normal cost) plus a 30 year amortization (on a level-dollar basis) of the unfunded actuarial accrued liability (past service liability). The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal costs each year and to amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed 30 years. The projection of future benefit payments for an ongoing plan involves estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the health care cost trend. Amounts regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, presented as required supplementary information following the notes to the financial statements, presents multi-year trend information about whether the actuarial value of the plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

P. Adjustments to Beginning Net Position

The District implemented GASB Statement No. 68 & 71 during the current fiscal year which resulted in accounting changes for net pension liability. Under previous standards, net pension liability was not recorded on the statement of net position. Under newly implemented standards the net pension liability is recorded as a liability on the statement of net position. In addition, resulting from a difference in the measurement date for the net pension liability, any contributions to pensions subsequent to the measurement date are now recorded as deferred outflows of resources. The changes due to accounting policies resulted in an adjustment to beginning net position as follows:

R. Commitments and Contingencies

Litigation

The District is involved in various litigation. In the opinion of management and legal counsel, the disposition of all litigation pending will not have a material effect on the financial statements.

State and Federal Allowances, Awards, and Grants

The District has received state and federal funds for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit by the grantor agencies. Although such audits could generate expenditure disallowances under terms of the grants, it is believed that any required reimbursement will not be material.

S. Subsequent Events

New Accounting Pronouncements

GASB Statement No. 72

In February 2015, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) issued Statement No. 72, Fair Value Measurement and Application. The primary objective of this Statement is to address accounting and financial reporting issues related to fair value measurements. This Statement requires a government to use valuation techniques that are appropriate under circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value. The techniques should be consistent with one or more of the following approaches:

The Market Approach: This approach uses prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets, liabilities, or a group of assets and liabilities.

The Cost Approach: This approach reflects the amount that would be required to replace the present service capacity of the asset.

The Income Approach: This approach converts future amounts (such as cash flows or income and expenses) to a single current (discounted) amount.

In addition to establishing fair value techniques the Statement establishes a hierarchy of inputs to valuation techniques and requires additional note disclosures about fair value in the financial statements. The requirements of this Statement will enhance comparability of financial statements among governments by requiring measurement of certain assets and liabilities at fair value using a consistent and more detailed definition of fair value and accepted valuation techniques. This Statement will also enhance fair value application guidance and related disclosures in order to provide information to financial statement users about the impact of fair value measurements on a government's financial position.

The Statement is effective for years beginning after June 15, 2015 and as such the District is implementing effective for the 2015-16 fiscal year.

GASB Statement No. 76

In June 2015, the GASB issued Statement No. 76, The Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles For State and Local Governments. The objective of this Statement is to identify, in the context of the current governmental financial reporting environment, the hierarchy of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This Statement supersedes Statement No. 55 and is effective for financial statement periods beginning after June 15, 2015 and as such the District is implementing effective for the 2015-16 fiscal year.

The general fund balance has decreased by \$741,459 over the past three years. The fiscal year 2015-16 budget projects a decrease of \$104,199. For a district this size, the state recommends available reserves of at least 3% of total general fund expenditures, other uses and transfers out.

Long-term debt has increased by \$8,643,751 over the past three years.

Average daily attendance (ADA) has decreased by 20 over the past three years.

B. Financial Statement Findings

Finding 2015-001 (30000) Associated Student Body Funds

Criteria or Specific Requirement

Determine whether internal controls are in place over student body funds that will ensure all student body receipts collected and disbursements paid are properly documented and that all proper transaction procedures are being followed.

Condition

In our review of the receipts and deposits of the San Pasqual Valley High School student body funds, we noted the following:

- 1 One out of twelve cash transmittal forms tested did not have a proper preparer signature and verification signature and one of the transmital forms was not legible so the amount could not be determined.
- 2 Three of the twelve cash transmittals tested did not have any supporting documentation other than what was written on the cash transmittal form.
- 3 Two of the twelve deposits tested did not have cash transmittal forms on file.

In our review of the disbursements and checks of the San Pasqual Valley High School student body funds, we noted the following:

- 1 Three out of eight disbursements tested did not have an invoice to support the disbursement.
- None of the eight invoices tested were defaced or stamped as "paid" in order to prevent duplicate payment.

Questioned Costs

None

Recommendation

We rerecommend that the District adopt procedures that require that supporting documentation be obtained for all deposits into the student body funds. We also recommend that the District adopt polices which require that all payments from student body funds will not be made without an original invoice.

LEA's Response

The District will meet with the Principals, ASB advisors, and accounting clerks to implement new procedures and requirements for the ASB. These requirements will include that cash transmittal forms are completed, signed, and approved. Also NO expenditures will be processed without the three required signatures and required documentation. Each of the expenditures will not be paid without an original invoice and must be reviewed by the Principal before it can be processed. Deposits will only be processed with supporting documentation. This will also be reviewed by the Principal and will require the Principal's signature. The ASB advisors and accounting clerks will attend additional training in the spring to assist in meeting the requirements. The District Office Business Services personnel will also be reviewing the ASB accounts and documentation at the end of each month.

A comprehensive list of responsibilities has been developed in regards to Coaches, student athletes, site secretaries, ticket takers. Cash box Request forms and ticket inventory forms have also been develop to assist.

- 3 Annual evaluation of the results achieved by the schoolwide program and revision of the schoolwide plan based on that evaluation (34 CFR section 200.26 (c)).

A schoolwide plan must also include the following five components:

- 1 Schoolwide reform strategies (34 CFR section 200.28(a)).
- 2 Instruction by highly qualified professional staff (34 CFR section 200.28 (b)).
- 3 Strategies to increase parental involvement (34 CFR section 200.28(c)).
- 4 Additional support to students experiencing difficulty (34 CFR section 200.28(d)).
- 5 Transition plans for assisting preschool children in the successful transition to the schoolwide program (34 CFR 200.28(e)).

Cause

Component 2, instruction by highly qualified professional staff was published in the school accountability report card rather than the school plan, and in the other shool's schoolwide plan. The district had established policies and procedures to ensure that the students be instructed by highly qualified professional staff, but due to a clerical oversight it was not included in the school plan.

Effect

1 out of 5 required components were not included in the schoolwide plans.

Recommendation

Provide training to school site councils and school site personnel as to the requirements for schoolwide plans. Work with the school site councils to ensure all required core elements and components are included in the schoolwide plans.

LEA's Response

The District will schedule training for the school site councils at all three sites for January 2016. The training will review school site council policies, procedures, and composition. The trainers will also review the components of the school wide plan.

The Elementary school wide plan for 2015-16 is currently being developed with the assistance of Larry Boese from the California Department of Education to ensure that all the components are covered correctly.

D. State Award Findings and Questioned Costs

Finding 2015-003 (10000) Attendance Reporting

Criteria or Specific Requirement

Determine that attendance reported to the California Department of Education is accurately reported and supported by contemporaneous records.

Condition

During our audit of attendance we noted the following conditions:

A. Teachers rosters at San Pasqual Elementary and at the Continuation School are not being printed and signed within one week from the end of the week of attendance. All class rosters are being signed by the teachers to verify attendance, but the verification is not done in a timely manner.

Questioned Costs

None, The district has established procedures that the teachers enter attendance into the system on a daily basis. While the verifications were not completed within state guidelines, the attendance was entered contemporaneously by individuals with first hand knowledge.

Context

California Education Code Section 44809 and California Code of Federal Regulations, Title 5, Section 401 require that the California Department of Education approve forms and procedures that constitute an LEA's attendance accounting system. The district has established a system whereby teachers are enter required attendance into an online system daily. Currently. California Department of Education approves online attendance accounting systems providing that teachers are signing and dating a weekly printout of attendance records entered into the online system during the previous week. This verification process by the teachers is intended to ensure that the data in the system is accurately reported. As an additional supporting record of attendance, attendance clerks should keep a phone log documenting calls made by parents to verify reasons for absences

Cause

School site personnel did not understand the purpose and requirement that teachers verify attendance weekly.

Effect

The school sites procedures were not consistent with approved attendance systems.

Recommendation

Establish written attendance procedures and provide to all school site personnel charged with the responsibility of attendance accounting. Provide training to ensure a complete understanding of the procedures. Monitor attendance accounting procedures to ensure that school sites are following required procedures.

SCHEDULE OF FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2015

LEA's Response

The District has scheduled a meeting with all principals and attendance clerks to improve the attendance process and procedures. Improved systems will be put into place to ensure that attendance clerks are printing rosters and teachers are reviewing and signing them on a regular and timely basis. This system will be monitored by the site administrator. Teachers will also be reminded monthly at each staff meeting.

Finding 2015-004 (40000)

After School Education and Safety Program

Criteria or Specific Requirement

Determine that the local education agency operating the After School Education and Safety Program is compliant with the state requirements for operating the after school program as cited under Education Code Section 14502.1.

Condition

In our review of the after school program and testing of pupil service days for San Pasqual Elementary School for the month of February 2105 we noted that there were differences between the number of students actually attending from a count of the student sign in and sign out sheets and a daily count prepared by the local education agency. At San Pasqual Valley Elementary School a total of 29 pupil service days out of 1,034 days tested were not deemed valid for the month of San Pasqual Valley Elementary School - a total of 29 days out of 1,034 days claimed are questioned for month of February 2015.

Questioned Costs

San Pasqual Valley Elementary School - a total of 29 days out of 1,034 days claimed are questioned for the pupils tested.

Cause

School site personnel prepare a manual count of students served at the end of each day. The manual count needs to be verified.

Effect

Attendance reported was overstated.

Recommendation

Establish monitoring procedures to ensure that the manual daily count prepared from the sign in and sign shhets agrees to the total of students served for that day.

LEA's Response

The District will work with the ASES Coordinator and Attendance Clerk to better monitor the daily attendance count for the two ASES sites. This will include training from the County ASES coordinator on the process. Regular cross checks will also be done by District and/or County personnel.

Finding 2013-5 (70000) Instructional Materials

Criteria or Specific Requirement

Verify that the District held a public hearing to determine the sufficiency of instructional materials within the first eight weeks of school as required by Education Code Section 60119.

Condition

The District held a public hearing to determine the sufficiency of instructional materials on December 9, 2014 which was after the statutory requirement of completing the public hearing within the first eight weeks of school.

Questioned Costs

None

Context

Education Code Section 60119 requires that the District must hold a public hearing within the first eight weeks of school to determine the sufficiency of instructional materials and supplies.

Effect

The District was not in compliance with requirements to receive funding under the instructional materials funding realignment program.

Cause

The District inadvertently left off their master calendar the requirement to hold the public hearing with in the first eight weeks of school.

Recommendation

Establish procedures to ensure public hearing is held within the first eight weeks of school to determine sufficiency of instructional materials and supplies.

LEA's Response

The district has established a procedural timeline that the Instructional Materials public hearing will take place at the September Board meeting. This will ensure that it always takes place within the first eight weeks of the school year. It has also been updated in the district operational calendar.

Finding 2014-1 Student Body Funds

In review of the student body funds at San Pasqual High School, ticket reconciliation forms were not being completed for events, cash transmittal forms did not have proper signatures or accurate collection dates, and the cash transmittal forms were being prepared by the individual receiving the funds and not by the person at the point of revenue origin. In addition, disbursements did not have proper invoice support, invoices were not stamped paid, and check requests were either incomplete or could not be located.

Implement procedures to correct the significant deficiencies in the student body controls. Require all cash transmittal forms to be complete, signed, and dated properly and utilize ticket reconciliations for all events held. Also, require all disbursements to have proper supporting invoice documentation and completed check requests.

Finding 2014-2 Attendance

In review of daily attendance at San Pasqual Elementary and San Pasqual High School, class attendance rosters were not being verified on a timely basis. Some rosters were being verified in excess of three months past the final attendance date for the period and some rosters did not have proper teacher signatures or date verification.

Establish controls to ensure all class attendance rosters are signed, dated, and verified within one week after the end of each attendance period. Monitor and review all class rosters to verify that all teachers are signing and dating the class attendance rosters on a timely basis.
